Apostrophes in Possessives

- Use an apostrophe to form the possessive of any noun, whether singular or plural.
 - For **singular** nouns, add 's even if the word ends in s.
 - Sam's baseball
 - Francis's cap
 - For **plural** nouns that end in **s**, add only an apostrophe.
 - The spectators' cheers
 - The players' uniforms
 - For plural nouns that do not end in s, add 's.
 - Women's team
 - Family's plan

Apostrophes in Contractions

- In a contraction, words are joined and letters are left out.
- An apostrophe replaces the letter or letters that are missing.
 - I am \rightarrow I'm
 - She is \rightarrow she's
 - Cannot \rightarrow can't
 - They have \rightarrow they've
 - You will → you'll
 - Was not \rightarrow wasn't

Possessive Pronouns

Possessive pronouns **never** use an apostrophe.

Contractions always use an

apostrophe.

Its It's \leftarrow It is

Your You're ← You are

Their They're ← They are

Whose Who's ← Who is

Apostrophes in Plurals

- Use an 's to form the plural of a **letter**, a **numeral**, or a **word** referred to as a word.
 - Your i's look like e's.
 - How many 6's are in her uniform number?
 - The sportscaster's report was filled with *too bad*'s and *next time*'s.
