How Do I Read Poetry?

- First: Literal Meaning (Summarize)
 - Look up unclear words
 - ► Paraphrase each line, couple lines, stanza, or section
 - ► Check for words that were left out, punctuation that groups parts together
- Second: Deeper Meaning
 - Make associations for meaning
 - Imagery
 - **▶** Emotion
 - ▶ Allusions
 - ► Figurative Language

Writing About a Poem's Form

- Rhythm: Meter
 - Often easier to hear when read aloud
 - ► Check for a *noticeable* rhythm like a nursery rhyme
 - What effect does the rhythm have
 - ▶ EX: drives the lines forward quickly, accents certain words, makes it feel lighthearted
- Rhyme (and other sound devices)
- Punctuation and line breaks
- Stanzas, couplets and quatrains
- Closed forms (like sonnet)

Writing About Poetic Language

- Connotation and Denotation
 - Connotation is the feeling associated with the word
 - Denotation is the dictionary definition
 - ► EX: inquisitive vs. nosy
- Figurative Language (Simile, metaphor, hyperbole, etc.)
 - ▶ Go beyond what the simile means to why the author chose that particular figure of speech
 - ► EX: fast as a rabbit, fast as lightning, fast as a racecar all mean very fast, but they're different
- Imagery
 - ▶ What pictures did the author "paint" in your head? Why?
- Symbolism
 - What could it stand for?

Writing About a Poem's Speaker

Speaker

- ► The speaker is NOT the same as the author (necessarily)
- ► The author may adopt a *persona* a character who may be similar or very different than the author
- ▶ Use clues within the poem to figure out what the speaker is like
- Use biographical information to figure out if the speaker and the author are similar or the same

Tone

- ► The attitude of the writer toward the subject matter of the work
- ► Verbal Irony watch for obvious opposites of what you'd expect, or subtle hints that all add up to an opposite message than what you'd expect (sarcasm)
- Describing tone with just the right word is important but can be hard avoid simply saying "positive" or "negative"
